

Dear Sisters of the Catholic Women's League:

Our CWL mission is to grow in our faith, and to witness to the love of God through ministry and service. Our core values are faith, service and social justice. We are blessed to serve the church, Canada and the world, fulfilling our theme: "Lord, here I am, send me." (Isaiah 6.8)

In this 104th CWL Winnipeg Diocesan Council Annual Meeting of Members, we are very grateful for the hospitality by our convention host council, the CWL of St. Augustine of Canterbury Church, Brandon, MB.

I am fascinated by the "Gregorian mission" given to Augustine of the St Andrew's Abbey in Rome. In 596 AD, Pope Gregory chose the Benedictine Abbot Augustine to lead a mission of 40 monks to evangelize the people of Britain, i.e., to take the gospel to the 'Angles' (now Anglo Saxons). He was way ahead of his time by his missionary style in the British Isles.

Inspired by the Holy Spirit the Pope gave Augustine these missionary principles: purify rather than destroy ancient temples and customs; let local peoples' festivals and rites be transformed into Christian feasts; retain local customs as far as possible. Read the texts of Pope Gregory's letter in Oxford Reference (https://www.oxfordreference.com/display/10.1093/oi/authority.20110803100337215)

St. Augustine died on May 26, 604 in Canterbury, Kent, UK. On his tomb this epitaph: "Here lies the Lord Augustine, first Archbishop of Canterbury, sent here by blessed Gregory, bishop of the city of Rome, who with the help of God, and aided by miracles, guided King Ethelbert and his people to the Faith of Christ." St. Augustine of Canterbury can truly be called the "Apostle of England."

It is fitting for us now to reflect on our present day mission and calling, our CWL vocation, while remembering the responses by Prophet Isaiah, Pope Gregory and St. Augustine of Canterbury to their missions, hence guiding us with the realization that our faith overcome fears, and that our love/service will bear fruit abundantly by social justice in our parishes and Archdioceses. Mother Mary's timeless words "Do whatever He (Jesus) tells you." (John 2.5) spoken to the servers at the wedding feast of Cana (her last words in the Bible) will energize us to be rooted in Gospel values, and mature in our holiness through service to the people of God.

Peace to you all and God's blessings in this Jubilee Year 2025!

Winnipeg Diocesan Executive Reports

Carol MacKenzie-Gruber – President Winnipeg Diocesan Council January 1 to December 31, 2024



15 out of 20 councils or 75% reporting

Thank you dear Presidents, acting Presidents and Councils. 79% of you responded to the 2024 Parish Council Annual Report Survey. One of you even hand-delivered your survey to the National Office! God bless you all. My report also includes what the vice president would have reported on from the survey.

National Theme: Most of you have focused on the national theme, "Here I am Lord; send me", in one way or another with a speaker, attending an on-line webinar, a workshop, or a retreat. And many of you have focused on mental health issues as National requested, with a speaker, finding out how to get help, and how mental illness affects homelessness, job security, violence, poverty.

New Executive Structure: 79% of you have embraced the new executive structure, but some of your comments regarding difficulty in managing stated that age and lack of members was an issue; in fact, it seems that it is the main issue of all councils. Sadly two councils disbanded this past year, and a third is near to that, and the issue as stated is that they can't recruit members to take positions, or they can't recruit period.

"1" Campaign: 64% of you said you had not used a membership campaign or project, 36% said they had. 60% said it was not successful. All councils encourage members to personally invite prospective members. 86% of you said that you encourage members and prospective members to visit the national website for information, and "Share the Words" was used by 36%.

Greatest Membership Challenge: 36% each said 'attracting new members' and 'attracting young members' was your biggest challenge and 21% said 'members not attending meetings' was a huge challenge for their council.

Despite the challenges of declining membership, you all do what you can to do service and justice in your parish, your community, in our country and throughout the world. We are strong and resilient women and continue to labour 'For God and Canada' in remarkable ways, and I thank you for that.

As president of the Diocesan Council, my challenge has been recruiting members to take on executive positions as well. After one year, and despite several phone calls, your diocesan executive remains short of a vice-president, a service and a social justice chair. For me, I was a long time coming to the CWL. I allowed someone's bias to influence me, and keep me from joining, and sisters, for that I am profoundly sorry. It is an honour for me to serve the CWL, as I am sure it is for you; thus, I extend a plea to you to consider serving a year's term in one of the available positions on diocesan council, or on your own parish council, many of which have unfilled executive positions.

Saint Pope John Paul said over and over again, 'Be not afraid'. I say to you, 'BE NOT AFRAID.' I encourage you to reply, 'Here I am Lord, send me!'

January 1 to December 31, 2024 15 of 20 councils = 75%

The primary method of communication most of the councils use to become informed of resources at various levels is by email and at meetings. The communiques, directives or memos are another popular method of informing members. Other methods include websites, word of mouth, telephone and text.

Communication of the executive with its members is primarily done monthly, however some councils communicate every two weeks and some as little as every two months or quarterly.

For councils accessing the national website there was one suggestion where they felt there was no direction on who to send information to the site. They had recently done a Red Sand service and had photos to submit and there was no indication as to who these should go to. Some felt the website was very informative with lots of resources available. Many like the calendar when you open the website.

Out of the councils reporting 8 councils view the National League postings on social media and 6 councils do not.

Out of the councils reporting, there are 6 councils who submitted pictures and a short description of a council event or occasion to share with others and 8 who did not.

There are 10 councils who have someone assist the secretary with communications activities.

Thank you everyone for taking the time to fill out the survey. This helps everyone make the CWL organization stronger and better able to move forward.

The following report is a summary of the activities by the councils of the Winnipeg Diocesan Catholic Women's League to promote the value of Faith in your councils.

(a) Spiritual Growth of Members

Catholic resources from the internet were a good resource for the members. Various prayer styles were used. Webinars have also provided a good source of spiritual growth for members.

(b) Study of Catholic Teaching

Encyclicals by Pope Francis were studied and read by Councils. The Catechism of the Catholic Church was encouraged to be studied. Guest speakers on religious topics were presented.

(c) Role of Women in the Church

In general, roles for Women in the Catholic Church have remained status quo.

(d). Evangelization and mission assistance

A few councils reported that they worked with other Churches to address common concerns.

(e). Lay ministries

Lay ministries have remained the traditional ones of Eucharistic Ministers, Lectors, and Catechists.

(f). Ecumenism and interfaith endeavours

Five councils participated in the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. World Day of Prayer was a popular event with 10 councils participating in the service.

I have enjoyed opportunity to be the Faith Chairperson this past year. The National Theme 'Here I am Lord; send me' tells each of us that we all have the opportunity to share in the mission of spreading our faith to God and Canada. May Our Lady of Good Counsel continue to bless us in our journey!



Carol MacKenzie-Gruber -Service



January 1 to December 31, 2024 15 out of 20 councils reported (75%)

Thank you, Service Chairs, for your reports. I have compiled them for the purpose of this report. 15 of 19 Councils or 79% responded, and many of you do not have active Service Chairs. You do your best to continue to serve your council, parish and community.

Communication from Service Standing Committee: All of you said you were satisfied with the communication from this committee. Just over half did not think there were any positive changes in the council due to the new structure of this standing committee. Most of you felt that the material on the website was adequate and that the chair was familiar with the material. Just under half of you did not agree because either you do not have a chair or your chair does not use the website.

Strategies to raise awareness about bullying, human trafficking, homelessness, racism, etc: It seems that most of you have been informed, either by your service chair, or your president, about issues related to the topics mentioned. Some of you held a Red Sand ceremony; you donate money, food, clothes to causes, knit mitts, etc., pray for issues in the news. You are very aware of social problems in the community.

Challenges the Chairperson of Service Face in efforts to relate to members, or to encourage women to join: Many of you felt that you did not meet often enough, that numbers of members are declining overall, that many members do not attend meetings, that your parishes are struggling so your fund-raising efforts go to keeping your parish alive, all of which limit what you can do out in the world, so to speak. A couple of councils said that it is a big responsibility and that you prefer to break the tasks down into small ones. One said that your meetings are held in the daytime which may prohibit younger women from joining.

Chairperson's Thoughts on the Effectiveness of the Standing Committee: It seems that many councils are dissatisfied with the structure of the Service Committee. The committee is so huge that it is impossible, with limited numbers of members, to do Service adequately, as one chair said. One of you thought that we should provide clear incentives for younger women to get involved with the CWL. Another felt that people have such busy lives and other commitments that they do not join.

In summary, I got a sense of the frustration that many of you are experiencing in carrying out the tasks that come under this committee. Despite that, you all managed to do a great deal of 'Service' activities, according to your highlights. You strive to serve 'God and Canada', to care for the poorest of the poor in your communities, to love your neighbour. As Saint Paul said "I thank my God each time I think of you". You are marvellous women, Women of the Gospel, Women of the Good News. God bless you all.



Chris Carlyle-- Social Justice
January to December 31, 2024
15 out of 20 councils reported = 75%

(a) What levels of government legislation and bylaws, resolutions take action on and what action was undertaken?

Over the last year over 70% of reporting councils monitored or acted on information related to federal and provincial legislation. Fewer at 30% monitored municipal or local government. These councils took part in letter writing but most frequently initiated a postcard campaign and petition signing at 70-80% of the time.

Half of reporting councils acted on resolutions at all governmental levels. Very few councils expressed interest in preparing or submitting a resolution.

(b) What Social Justice resources have councils utilized from the national website?

The majority of councils did not use the resources available on the national website. Of the resources accessed, the most used were Catholic social justice teaching and workshop manual and Walking together with Indigenous Catholic Women. Almost 70% of these councils state either they were not aware of the resources or did not use them.

c) What areas of Catholic social teaching has the council addressed through discussion, action or both?

Overwhelmingly, councils reported discussing the teaching related to upholding life and dignity of the human person plus advocating for the poor and vulnerable and their inclusion in society. About one third of reporting councils also addressed care of God's creation in their meetings. Very few discussed advocating for the dignity of work and equal rights of workers.

(d) How would councils rate the impact of social justice activities on members?

Over half of councils reported a very positive or somewhat positive impact of activities on members. About a third were unable to rate this question

(e) Comments:

- Councils support local causes with their limited resources and time.
- Lack of computer knowledge and comfort is quoted as a reason resources are not used
- One comment stated the structure limits membership involvement.
- A council held a Red Sand Ceremony with collected funds donated to IWIN (I'm Worth It Now) who provided backpacks to local Winnipeg Dignity House
- Volunteer participation at Winnipeg Harvest

15 out of 20 councils reported = 79%

(a) Communicating/upkeep of Policy and Procedure

National Executive has revised and implemented many revisions to the Policy and Procedure Manual. These revisions have been shared at parish council meetings by over half of reporting councils. The Past President's role is to educate membership of changes and see they are adhered to.

(b) Maintaining archives

Membership enjoys reviewing past events and history of their councils. This process is part of the past president's role to either maintain the archive or assign a member to do so. Half of councils reporting do just that. Sometimes a member who is especially interested in history will assume the duty of collecting pictures and recording events. Seven of the 14 councils reporting do not attend to this effort or the position is vacant.

(c) Advising the new president and executive is an important part of maintaining procedure and process. Over 70% of past presidents find themselves in the role of an advisor. Two councils reported they were not asked for advice. This is possibly due to the president sitting for more than one term so the past president role is vacant. When advice involves election process or council policy and procedure manual updates, the past president is most often involved. Well over half of past presidents are fulfilling this duty.

In today's environment, everyone at one time or another has been faced with a scam, either by telephone, cell phone, email or searching the web. It is extremely important that we all know what to do in the event that we experience this type of criminal activity.

The telephone has become the main way that scammers try to steal money. Some of the tactics are as follows:

- They tell you that they will send police to your door if you do not send money
- Pretending to be fundraising for a charity
- Pretending to be a relative or a friend in trouble who needs money
- Trying to sell a service that is not needed
- Asking to help them "catch criminals" who are committing fraud
- Asking for personal information about your financial institution
 The cell phone is another popular venue for fraudsters to try and get money from you:
- Receiving a message telling you that a package has not arrived
- Your subscription has expired
- Your credit card or account has been charged for something --Email or searching the Web
- An email asking to send a gift card or money to someone whose name you know
- An email from a company that wants to sell something or offer you a deal just delete
- Receiving an email saying a friend (using friend's name) has sent you some pictures, click here.
 DON'T
- If a big box pops up on your computer indicating that your computer is compromised and you must call for technical support, DON'T. If it doesn't go away, take your computer to where you bought it to have it cleaned. Never use online tech support
- If you think you have been scammed, talk to a trusted friend or family member about it. These criminals rely on people being too embarrassed to tell anyone that they have been scammed. If you have been scammed, report it to the police.

- Diocesan Council does not have a Service Chair, but by your annual reports, all councils do an amazing work in caring for their sisters in the League and the people in their parish community, and beyond.
- I discovered something very interesting in looking at the handbook for chairpersons today. I am not sure why it didn't click before, but I quote from the handbook. "Once a council determines the topics and activities that its interests and particular charism lead it to for the year, the next step will be for the **three chairpersons to develop a coordinated approach** to addressing these. For example, this could mean developing spiritual programs that reflect the topic/activity, seeking out and engaging in opportunities for service related to the topic, and advocating to the appropriate level of the government regarding the topic." Practically speaking, if the service chair has arranged for a speaker on a topic, the faith chair could do a prayer service based on what the speaker's topic is.
- The League does not mean for us to work alone, but together. In working together we develop stronger ties of sisterhood. In a time in history, when societal norms seek to shatter connection, this is a stand against that isolationism. SOCIAL JUSTICE: Chris Carlyle

- The focus topics of Social Justice Nationally are Human Trafficking, Palliative Care and Care of God's Creation.
- You are familiar with all three topics. Human Trafficking was very well addressed in the
 webinar aired January 21st, "Finding Hope in the Fight Against Human Trafficking". This
 webinar can still be seen by clicking on the link at www.cwl.ca. The presentation featured
 three guest speakers telling their story of accomplishments fighting human trafficking by
 creating resolutions, advocating to government and supporting women trying to escape
 human trafficking.
- I know some of you attended the Manitoba Provincial Council Day of Celebration. This well attended event addressed palliative care. Simone Stenekes – Clinical Nurse Specialist Pediatric Palliative Care and Dr. Paul Daeninck – Medical Oncologist/Palliative Care

Specialist, both working in Winnipeg providing expert care to Manitobans, spoke to us about care offered people facing life limiting illness. In the afternoon Steve Chipman shared his experiences working at the Immaculate Conception Drop-In Center for over 20 years. Unfortunately, food insecurity is a growing problem. The area around the drop-in center is statistically one of the poorest postal code areas in Canada. Both topics supported CWL member's drive to support the vulnerable people in our communities.

Winnipeg Diocesan Council Standing Rules of the 104th Annual Meeting of Members

[Annual Meeting of Members further referred to as AMM]

Each AMM sets its own standing rules in accordance with *Robert's Rules of Order*. They are applicable for the duration of the AMM in session only. Even though the standard rules may be the same from one year to the next, the rules must be adopted by each new AMM.

At the beginning of the business session of an AMM, the rules are read and a motion is proposed, discussed and voted on to adopt the standing rules of the AMM. The motion to adopt the standing rules requires a two-thirds majority vote; a motion to rescind or amend the rules once they have been adopted requires a two-thirds majority vote; and a motion to suspend a rule requires a majority vote.

- Each person attending the AMM shall register at the registration desk and wear the official identifying lanyard.
- Registrants shall be classified as voting delegates (Parish Council Presidents or designates) or accredited delegates (Diocesan Accredited, Parish Accredited, Life Members of the Winnipeg diocese).
- Accredited voters may vote on any question except the election of officers, amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws and increases to per capita fees.
- O In order to vote all voting and accredited credentials must be submitted at registration.
- Voting cards shall be issued to the voting members (of the Winnipeg Diocese) and exhibited when a member votes.
- Voting delegates shall sit within the areas designated for them at all business sessions of the AMM unless prior arrangement has been made with the Chair.
- Those wishing to speak, shall use the microphone and upon being recognized by the Chair, state name, status and council.
- O No member shall speak more than once or longer than two minutes on the same motion or issue without permission of the Chair, but the mover may reply before the vote is taken.
- Only resolutions submitted to the Resolutions Standing Committee in advance of this AMM shall be considered for presentation.
- O No goods shall be distributed, displayed or sold at this AMM without the prior approval of the Chair.
- The Diocesan President shall appoint a Minutes Review Committee to verify minutes of AMM.
- The Diocesan Executive shall approve the minutes of this AMM at its post AMM meeting.
- The approved minutes of the AMM shall be circulated to all voting members. If corrections are necessary after approval they may be made by motion at the next AMM.

Robert's Rules of Order

The League follows Robert's Rules of Order. A booklet, based on Robert's Rules of Order, 'Parliamentary Procedure' by Edith Mockler - Life Member and Registered Parliamentarian, was revised May, 2020. It is available from the CWL National Office. [Item No. 617]

Section 1 – The chair shall (a) state all questions, motions and resolutions to the meeting before they are open to discussion; and (b) put all questions, motions and resolutions to the meeting before the vote is taken thereon.

Section 2 – Every motion shall have a seconder except a motion to nominate. A motion that is not seconded shall not be put to the meeting and shall not be recorded in the minutes.

Section 3– The mover shall have the privilege of speaking first to a motion and the seconder next.

Section 4 – When two or more members stand at the same time to speak, the Chair shall determine the order in which those members shall speak.

Section 5 – During the discussion of a question, each speaker shall be limited to three minutes.

Section 6 – A member may request that the question or motion be repeated or re-read but must not interrupt a speaker.

Section 7 – No member shall speak more than once to the same question or motion without the consent of the Chair, but the mover may reply before the vote is taken.

Section 8 – No member shall speak to a question or motion after the Chair has asked for the yeas and nays.

Section 9 – Only one amendment to the amendment shall be allowed, but when an amendment to the amendment has been disposed of, another amendment may be proposed. An amendment to the amendment shall be voted on first, the amendment next, and the motion last.
