My loving sisters of League and friends,

I am always pleased to write a loving message for the annual CWL booklet. It is my privilege to acknowledge the progress made by our members of CWL.

Our God says that creation should be restored to the original way. The whole story of incarnation—God becoming flesh (John 1:1)—is that God wants to be closer to His creation. St. Paul tells us that “the whole creation has been groaning in labor pain” ready to “be set free from its bondage to decay,” as it “waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God” (Rom 8:18-25) who are ready to care for this world. In our world, we are unjust and thankless people of this earth. We have placed ourselves above others; we care about our own security than security of all; and we try to act as if that we are the center of the universe. We have sold our land and people as commodities to the bigger market. We tried to pursue a standard of living without looking for the impact on creation. Continue to support one another. I am pleased to bestow and pray for God’s blessings upon everyone of the members of our League.

You are active in your respective parishes, you visit the sick and shut-ins, you feed the hungry, you sew, knit and donate clothing, mitts, toques, coats, socks, footwear and blankets to those in need, you throw baby showers for organizations that support young mothers, the list goes on. You work together to create successful fundraisers, which in turn support many and varied charities not only within your communities, our country, but also globally. All of this fits in beautifully with our Provincial Theme, “**The Seed that Flowers**”. In keeping with all of this, our ladies have responded! To this end, I am humbled that collectively, we diverted from the landfills and donated 32,100 plastic bags in 2019 to two schools in support of “Bag Up Manitoba”! SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT:

Our general meetings always begin with reciting of the Rosary; Mass was also celebrated several times throughout the year. Reflections were on several topics: message from Pope John Paul II, written in 1984, that God's love for us is eternal; information regarding female education; words from an 11 yr. old girl who traveled with her family doing missionary work; a quote from St. Teresa of Avila, dated in the 1500's that reminded us how God works through each of us; a message that we are not to let worry overtake our lives, but to turn to scripture readings that remind us that God is always with us and there for us; reminders to trust in prayer.

Many of our members are active in the Liturgy at weekly and weekend Masses as Readers, and Eucharistic Ministers.

We hosted the World Day of Prayer service in March, and co-hosted, with the Salvation Army, the service for Fellowship of the Least Coin in November. We provided lunch following the mass celebrating the feast of Our Lady of Good Counsel in April and also for the Anointing of the Sick mass in June. We held a brunch the end of May to celebrate Fr. We installed a new member, Lisa Crone, at our June meeting.

COMMUNITY LIFE:

Donations of toiletries, winter clothing, toys/gifts for children, and non-perishable food items were made to the Women's Safe Haven/Resource Centre, Kids North, the Aboriginal Friendship Centre Christmas program, the Lord's Bounty Food Bank. Monetary donations were also made to five schools in our area to help out with their breakfast/lunch programs. Members helped deliver Meals on Wheels in September. Our Council participated in the Bag-Up Manitoba program for recycling of plastic bags. We also donated can tabs towards the TABS for Wheelchairs program. Samaritan's Purse Christmas Child shoe boxes were filled and donated in November. Many Christmas dainties trays were made up and delivered to shut-ins in December.

CHRISTIAN FAMILY LIFE:

Birthday greetings and a Mass card are sent to members who celebrate the following birthdays: 65, 70, 75, 80 & 85. Those who are blessed to be 90 yrs. young and more receive a Mass intention each year. Archbishop Murray Chatlain and our pastor, Fr. Paul Bringleston, also receive a card and Mass Intention for their birthdays. Cards are sent for those celebrating special wedding anniversaries. Mass intentions are given in sympathy on the death of a CWL member or immediate family member. Our members assist at weekly Mass at the Personal Care Home as well as participate at daily and Sunday Mass as Readers and/or Eucharistic Ministers. We co-hosted a Family Brunch with the Knights of Columbus the last Sunday of January. We supplied lunch following the Anointing of the Sick service in June. Members are encouraged to donate baby items for the Knights of Columbus Dresser project each year. This dresser is presented annually to a single mom who is in need of assistance. Our League purchases carnations for our parish children to deposit, on Mother's Day, to our Blessed Mother, Mary and on Christmas Eve, the flowers are presented for the Baby Jesus. We regularly receive correspondence from Provincial and National on information pertaining to these two committees. Our committee chair, Lucille, attends as many of the meetings as possible and keeps us updated. No resolution was submitted by our Council.

OTHER : I have held a few positions in my 48 years as a CWL member, both at Parish and Diocesan level, and always enjoy working with my Sisters for our council. These last two years, during my term as President, have been both rewarding and educational.

We have a very active council that participates fully in our own fundraising events (St. Pat's Tea, perogy bees,) as well as being very involved in the two major Parish fundraisers (Fall Supper and annual Bazaar). After the service is when we discuss any items relevant to the league.

We have ten members and one in the Phillipines who wishes to remain a member in case she returns to Canada. Members are active in the lay led church services in the absence of a priest as well as taking communion to the patients at the hospital. Our members are quite elderly and can't do much as far as meetings are concerned but they do help out when they can. So that leaves only three to five of us to do the rest.

We present little gifts and certificates to all participants receiving the sacraments. SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT

The League prayer and a decade of the rosary are said at the beginning of each meeting. Two members participated in the planning of World day of prayer 2019 and 6 members attended the event on March 1st, which was hosted by the Westminster United Church.

Some members attended the Lenten Retreat on March 4th and 5th and our council led Stations of the Cross on two occasions during Lent. On April 9th, members assisted with Chrism mass by decorating the cathedral, preparing and serving lunch following mass.

A celebration of Our Lady of Good Counsel Feast Day was celebrated on April 28th at A&W. After a bite to eat, we enjoyed cake and ice cream. Our council assisted the NET Team with a monetary donation of \$100.00 to buy pizza during their youth retreat in May. Members continue to lead the rosary during the months of May and October.

We also recited the rosary prior to mass at St. Paul's Residence once and prior to mass for The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. COMMUNITY LIFE

Our Education and Health chairperson has been actively participating with the Anti Human Trafficking Awareness Committee based out of the Vancouver Diocese. The "Buying Sex is a Crime" vignettes can be viewed at buyingsexisacrime.org as well as on facebook. One member continues to organize our "Operation Christmas Child" Shoeboxes and the St. Paul's Gift Giving Christmas tree. (Anyone who picks a name from the tree is encouraged to take their purchased gift to St. Paul's Residence and spend a bit of time with the recipient). Our council continues sponsorship for a young girl in Ukraine through Chalice. Participated in the HUG project with 2 members collecting and organizing donations to the Women's Shelter in The Pas. Our council collects pop tabs for wheelchairs and contributed to the "Bag Up Manitoba" project. Annual monetary donations are given to the local soup kitchen and Kelsey Community School for their Christmas Feast. On the 3rd annual "World Day of The Poor", we once again put out a grocery cart and it was overflowing with donations which were distributed between Oscar's place and the soup kitchen. Collected non perishables and hats, toques, scarves and mitts at our Christmas mass and supper which were also distributed between the two places. Our council pays for a Remembrance Day wreath each year and one member places it at the ceremony.

CHRISTIAN FAMILY LIFE

Our April meeting was held at St. Paul's Residence so members there could attend. Presented gifts and cards to 14 children receiving their first Holy Communion. Did the Rosary for Life - Joyful Mysteries on one occasion in October. Members planned a Birthday/Christmas party at St. Paul's Residence. The Community Choir provided an evening of song and members served beverages , cake and ice cream.

EDUCATION AND HEALTH

On April 3rd, we had a power point presentation by Lori Veito RN,BN about the Community Wellness Challenge. Two members attended the diocesan convention in May and four attended the provincial. We had 6 bursary applications and the \$400.00 award was presented to the granddaughter of one of our members at her high school graduation. A monetary donation was sent to the National Bursary Fund in place of Development and Peace. Members were involved with organizing and doing presentations at the Diocesan study Days. As in the past, members prepared and served one meal as well as contributed baking and offered assistance where needed.

Standing Rules of 68th Annual convention**

Each convention sets its own standing rules in accordance with *Robert's Rules of Order*. They are applicable for the duration of the convention in session only. Even though the standard rules may be the same from one year to the next, the rules must be adopted by each new convention.

At the beginning of the business session of a convention, the rules are read and a motion is proposed, discussed and voted on to adopt the standing rules of the convention. This motion requires a two-thirds vote. To rescind or amend the rules once they have been adopted requires a two-thirds vote. To suspend a rule requires a majority vote.

1. Each person attending the convention shall register at the convention registration desk and shall be required to wear the official convention badge for admission to all meetings.
2. Voting cards shall be issued to the voting members (of the Keewatin-The Pas Diocese) and these cards must be exhibited when a member votes.
3. Voting and accredited delegates shall sit within the areas designated for them at all business sessions of the convention unless prior arrangement has been made with the Chair.
4. No member shall speak more than once or longer than two minutes on the same motion, without permission of the Chair, but the mover may reply before the vote is taken.
5. Only resolutions submitted to the Resolution Standing Committee in advance of this convention shall be considered for presentation to the convention.
6. No member shall speak longer than two minutes on any issue without prior authorization of the chair.
7. No goods shall be distributed, displayed or sold at this convention without the prior approval of the Chair.

Roberts Rules of Order

The League follows Robert's Rules of Order. A booklet entitled "Parliamentary Procedure at a Glance" by O. Garfield Jones, based on Robert's Rules of Order is available from CWL National Office (Item No.53)

Section 1- The chair shall (a) state all questions, motions and resolutions to the meeting before they are open to discussion; and (b) put all questions, motions and resolutions to the meeting before the vote is taken thereon.

Section 2- All motions shall be submitted in writing before they are presented to the meeting except

- (a) to postpone the reading of the minutes;
- (b) to suspend the order of business;
- (c) to lay on the table
- (d) to postpone a discussion
- (e) to call the previous question;
- (f) for a vote of thanks;
- (g) to adjourn
- (h) to nominate.

Section 3- Every motion shall have a seconder except a motion to nominate. A motion that is not seconded shall not be put to the meeting and shall not be recorded in the minutes.

Section 4- Members when speaking shall stand, address the Chair and endeavour to be terse and audible.

Section 5- The mover shall have the privilege of speaking first to a motion and the seconder next.

Section 6- When two or more members stand at the same time to speak, the Chair shall determine the order in which those members shall speak.

Section 7- During the discussion of a question, each speaker shall be limited to three minutes.

Section 8- A member may request that the question or motion be repeated or re-read but must not interrupt a speaker.

Section 9- No member shall speak more than once to the same question or motion without the consent of the Chair, but the mover may reply before the vote is taken.

Section 10- No member shall speak to a question or a motion after the Chair has asked for the yeas and nays.

Section 11- Only one amendment to the amendment shall be allowed, but when an amendment to the amendment has been disposed of, another amendment may be proposed. An amendment to the amendment shall be voted on first, the amendment next and the motion last.

Section 12- When a question has been decided, any member who has voted in the majority may move for a reconsideration of the question at the same meeting or, subject to previous notice being given, at the next regular meeting. No discussion of the main question shall be allowed unless the motion for consideration has been carried by a vote of two-thirds of the member present at the meeting.

Section 13- There shall be no circulation of material, petitions or solicitation of funds during any meeting without the prior authorization and /or approval of the Chair.
