

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

### MARY, MOTHER OF THE CHURCH - KIM SCAMMELL

#### 1. National Food Bank Project:

Mary, Mother of the Church Parish Council participated in the National Food Bank Project. Appealing to local members and parishioners, the council collected 504 pounds of food, which was donated to Manitoba Harvest. A "COVID safe" project to undertake, the council



appreciated the many contributions made at a time when parishioners were cautiously returning to church. The council is pleased to have been part of this cross-country effort where 38,557 pounds of food was collected, as well as \$43,319 in monetary donations to alleviate hunger in Canada.

#### 2. Fall Rummage Sale:



As churches and CWL councils began to resume their regular activities, the MMOC council courageously resumed its semi-annua rummage sale in September 2022. With the assistance of the Knights of Columbus, parish youth ministry and many non-CWL members of the parish, the CWL was able to get back to some regular activities. Aside from raising funds for charity, the

following groups were also provided with items: Chez Nous, Missionaries of Charity Sister, and St. Norbert Personal Care Home. An immigrant family from Peru were able to shop for needy items prior to the sale. The leftover items were donated to Centre Flavie-Laurent.

#### 3. National Day of Truth and Reconciliation:

In recognition of the 2<sup>nd</sup> National Day of Truth and Reconciliation, on September 30, 2022, MMOC CWL hosted a service of remembrance. CWL members and parishioners were invited to wear orange shirts, to spend an hour in prayer to remember the children who never returned home from residential schools, and to listen to guest speaker Fr. Francois Paradis, facilitator for the Returning to Spirit program, an indigenous-led non-profit that provides reconciliation workshops.

### NOTRE DAME DE LORETTE - LUCILLE CHAY

#### 1. Fundraiser for Ukrainian immigrants

In September, our council hosted a Gourmet Poutine & Bevy night and silent auction at the Dawson Trail Motor Inn; some of the proceeds of the fundraiser were designated to assist Ukrainian newcomers to Manitoba. Many members donated items for the silent auction and other donations were solicited from local merchants. Over 25 silent auctions prompted



large sales of tickets, and some donors also offered financial donations. The evening was a huge success and we were able to donate \$2500.00 to the Canadian Ukrainian Congress.

#### 2. Adopt a Highway

### ACTING PRESIDENT - Lacey Bernardín

Many councils continue to struggle in returning to their pre-pandemic activity with only 25% of the councils back at 100% as well as at 75%. The majority of the councils (38%) are only back at 50%. A small amount remains at 25% activity.

In relation to the changes to the League's structure, many councils feel that it will be easier to fill the vacancies within the executive as there are now fewer chairs to worry about. Many councils feel that this will be a great way to reflect on what they do already within those chairs and it will also be a new learning experience. Unfortunately, the changes did were the deciding factor in one of the councils deciding to disband. Most councils have used the presentation created by St. Boniface Diocesan Council to help understand the changes as well as guiding their members through the transition. The majority (38%) of councils who have asked for guidance have found it helpful while a smaller portion (25%) only found it somewhat helpful. As Many councils did not ask for any guidance on this issue.



In regards to how the councils are working with the theme of Catholic and Living, while a small number of councils have not been able to work with it, the majority have done so much with this

theme. The councils have: adopted the Catholic and Living Prayer as their closing prayer, handed out all the theme brochures, hosted guest speakers, studying the virtues at the meetings, novenas, retreats, monthly masses, Living Rosary, votive candles in Mary's Corner, inspirational thoughts and prayers through Flocknotes, enhancing the lives of those in need with monetary donations, educate members

on pertinent issues, helping refugees, donations of clothing, Christmas Hampers, helping in various roles during mass, and many more! So proud of you ladies!



Almost all councils have an active Spiritual Advisor for their councils. They will say masses before the meetings, attend meetings, says prayers and blessings, gives messages, attends CWL events and installs officers at mass. These Spiritual Advisors are greatly appreciated.

Eight of our parish councils contributed to the 2022 Parish Council Annual Report Survey. Of the eight that participated, one of them has just recently been disbanded. As this council was still considered a council during the time of the survey their answers were included in the total results.



Three of the councils, or 37.5%, have a newsletter and five, or 62.5%, do not have a newsletter. The primary method of communication for all of the councils who participated in the survey is email. One council also uses phone calls in addition to emails. Half of the councils use Facebook or other social media platforms in addition to emails, parish bulletins, community newspapers and community message boards.

Five of the councils in the survey use the national website. Each council uses the national website to get different information. Some use it sparingly and others use it more often. Councils reported that they use the national website resources for downloading forms, prayers, workshops, videos, and exploring what is new in the CWL.

#### TREASURER - SUZANNE MOORE

There are 6 national voluntary funds that councils donate to. Donation amounts are as follows: Catholic Missions in Canada - 5 councils donated a total of \$325



with the average per council being \$65, Catholic Near East Welfare Association - 4 councils donated a total of \$75 with the average per council being \$19, CCCB Palliative Care Kit - 3 councils donated a total of \$50 with the average per council being \$17, COADY International Institute - 6 councils donated a total of \$245 with the average per council being \$41, Development and Peace Caritas Canada - 6 councils donated a total of \$423 with the average per council being \$71 and, Euthanasia Prevention Coalition - \$0 were donated. In total, the

councils donated \$16, 081 to various charities in the year 2022.

Most councils prepare yearly and monthly financial statements as well as having their books audited every year along with all other duties assigned to Treasurer.

#### PAST PRESIDENT





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# SPIRITUAL DEVELOPMENT - Sharon Kennedy

Eight of our parish councils contributed to the 2022 Parish Council Annual Report Survey. Of the eight that participated, one of them has just recently been disbanded. As this council was still considered a council during the time of the survey their answers were included in the total results.



All of the councils except for one have found a way to work with the theme Catholic and Living it. Many chose to re-establish pre-Covid activities such as charity work and other such activities that promote social justice as well as participating in saying the Rosary and other prayerful activities. Councils prayed for things like

Palliative Care, Seminarians, Truth and Reconciliation, and Indigenous People of Canada.

All of the councils in this survey, except for two, have a Spiritual Advisor. Of the two councils without, one had lost their Spiritual Advisor because he had suddenly passed away. They were very happy and appreciative of how he participated in their council before his passing. All of the councils who had Spiritual Advisors were happy with them. All of the Spiritual Advisors mentioned were supportive of members and participated in council activities including meetings.

The majority of councils, 67%, used a variety of prayer styles to assist members in their communal and personal prayer life. Half of the councils, 50%, used other methods such as resources and spiritual programs from the National website's strategic plan, retreats, online webinars, spiritual reading and book clubs.



A large majority, 83%, of councils assisted members in their growth in the Catholic Faith by sharing information from Catholic Sources. Half, 50%, of the councils also used courses, programs, workshops and guest speakers in their growth in the



Catholic Faith. Half of the councils assisted members in keeping up to date on the role of women in the Church, such as canon law allowing female altar servers and readers, and the appointment of women to positions in the Vatican. Those councils that kept their members up to date used websites, guest speakers and various Catholic documents such as

bishops' conferences and news from the Vatican.

Two councils have supported the St. Boniface Diocese Good Shepard Campaign financially and other councils have found alternative ways of support which include prayer and offering seminarians encouragement and affirmation on their spiritual journey.

#### ORGANIZATION - Connie McCorrister-Moravek

Growing pains have occurred in all Parish Councils over the past 20 or so years – for example, I became a member in January 2004 when there were over 100,000 members across Canada. The CWL has definitely shrunk. Has this been a sign of the times or the way things work as the world progresses? Are we

leaving a better place for our children and grandchildren to share our values? Do our children want our organization or many other organizations that are struggling to stay alive? These questions are not new and I am glad that measures have been taken to ensure the likeliness that The Catholic Women's League of Canada will survive.

Yes, some Councils within our Diocese seem to have had little or no support from their own members or other levels. This seems to have been translated into three councils disbanding, two councils as prayer councils, and several councils struggling to a major degree. Were the disgruntled members asked how this organization could be made better? Is this due to the Covid – 19 Pandemic? The answers to these two questions are yes and no. The Strategic Plan came into being earlier than the Pandemic so we can't blame it for our membership dropping so drastically. The Pandemic didn't help but it wasn't the cause of the loss of membership in our Diocese.

A concentrated look at the results of the 2022 Parish Council Annual Report Survey has affected my view of the Catholic Women's League of Canada in a positive way. Most councils have continued in specific ways to keep up our Sisterhood throughout the many *changes* brought about by the Strategic Plan. Members are willing to learn to do things within three committees rather than eight. Seventeen programs have been developed and made available to all councils on the National website. As we enter the final year of the implementation of the Plan, we



Catholic Women are still interested in current and past topics of discussion which are being presented to us in a different format. This is a chance for all councils to explore the new technology available to attract younger members. This is a way to help the League grow in today's teachings of Gospel values!

#### CHRISTIAN FAMILY LIFE

Eight of our parish councils contributed to the 2022 Parish Council Annual Report Survey. Of the eight that participated, one of them has just recently been disbanded. As this council was still considered a council during the time of the survey their answers were included in the total results.

All of the councils in the survey engaged in some way in helping Ukrainian refugees transition to their new life in Canada. Some gave donations or raised money for the Canadian Ukrainian Congress to aid refugees. In addition to financial a donation one council also donated winter clothing to the Ukrainian Federation and one council has a member who helps children with their English language skills.





All of the councils participated in the Food Bank Project. Most collected food to donate to a local food bank or the Holy Cross Food Bank or Siloam Mission. One council participated in the webinar on human trafficking presented by Joy Smith.

A majority of councils, 63%, used the Development and Peace – Caritas brochure to promote projects supported by the League. A large majority, 88%, used the Catholic Near East Welfare Association brochure to promote projects supported by the League.

Many councils provided a scholarship or a bursary to promote or assist Catholic education in their parish or community. One donated to the CWL National Bursary Fund and one donated money for a Grad Gift.

A large majority, 88%, participated in the Palliative care postcard campaign; 63% participated in a Webinar on palliative care on May 7, 2022 and 63% also participated in 12 hours of Prayer for Palliative Care.

Three quarters, or 75%, of the councils in the survey educated their members on the League's partnership with Blood Services. And all, 100%, of councils in the survey planned some kind of action for World Water Day on March 22, 2022, Earth Day on April 22, 2022, and Earth Action Initiative, September 2022.

#### COMMUNITY LIFE

Within the 2022 Parish Council Report Survey, the old way of doing God's work is slowly becoming the new way. Of the six councils that responded to the question regarding the Food Bank Project, three answered 'yes' we did and three 'not' specifically. The three answering not specifically are still helpful in building community in their own ways – examples included local food bank,

Holy Cross food bank, Siloam Mission, and Missionary of Charity Sisters. Other donations included preparing and serving a meal for the Immaculate Conception soup kitchen; collecting pill bottles to be filled with shampoo

and soap; during the Winter, collecting socks, hats, mitts and scarves and during the summer water bottles and individually packaged snacks; things

collected at a baby shower were given to *You Can't Spoil a Baby;* collected food and gifts for 20 Christmas hampers. Members of one council invited parish members to participate in making their local community grow stronger.

For the question relating to Joy Smith's webinar, most did not attend but are aware of Joy Smith's work on Human Trafficking. Those who attended the webinar learned how widely prevalent human trafficking is in Canada and what to do if they suspect trafficking in their community.

Yes, our councils helped Ukrainian refugees transition to their new life in Canada by financial donations, winter clothing, and working with three children to increase their English Language skills.

> Three of the eight councils said "yes" to using the Development and Peace – Caritas Canada brochures to promote projects supported by the League. Remember these brochures are still available for using in the new committees Faith, Social Justice and Service. So hopefully after we are all secure in this post-pandemic time, we can take a look at other projects further out from our country's communities and support them too!

Regarding the brochure for the Catholic Near East Welfare Association, we can do better than one council making use of it. We will see what happens in our hearts.

#### EDUCATION & HEALTH

Educating our loved ones is an important practise for most Canadians. Educating to be Catholic is another thing parents want for their loved ones. Many parishes within the St Boniface Diocese have a school on the grounds of the Church building or nearby. Ways our CWL members assist Catholic Education is mostly monetary with scholarships, bursaries, and gifts for baptisms, First Communion, Sacrament of Confirmation to the students themselves, but other assistance occurs. CWL members teach catechism, attend monthly meetings and provide information to other members, invite staff and parents to participate in meetings and include them in CWL activities and prayed for students and staff returning to school.

The monetary scholarships/bursaries/gifts are given to a graduating parishioner, a local student who is pursuing higher education, a graduate of the local Catholic High School, or to students who are continuing with their Catholic Education. One council supported the CWL National Bursary Fund in 2022.





CWL Health projects participation slowed to a great degree and in some cases by 100%: Mental Health Postcard and Palliative Care Postcard Campaigns; webinar on Palliative Care; 12 Hours of Prayer for Palliative Care; League's partnership with Blood Services Canada; World Water Day (100%); Earth Day (100%);

or Earth Action Initiative (100%) (WUCWO). Remember we are still returning to CWL activities after the COVID – 19 Pandemic.

#### <u>COMMUNICATIONS</u>



The primary form of communications by all councils is through email. Some additional forms that are used are: Newsletters, minutes, church bulletins, church websites, local newspaper as well as making phone calls. No council has their own social media page, however, many members will post to their personal pages about upcoming events and activities. Councils also submit to Spotlight, use Flocknotes and submit to local newspapers. Five

councils report having a council newsletter with three not having one.

All reporting councils have reported using the National website. They use it for upcoming events, what the CWL is currently focusing on, resource usage, forms, videos, workshops and prayers. Councils report that they are all using it more and trying to explore more of the videos.

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#### RESOLUTIONS

Eight of our parish councils contributed to the 2022 Parish Council Annual Report Survey. Of the eight that participated, one of them has just recently been disbanded. As this council was still considered a council during the time of the survey their answers were included in the total results.

Two councils, (25%) reported that they distribute the League's "Pornography Hurts" postcards, and six (75%) reported that they did not distribute the postcards.

One council out of the eight (13%) reported as having the position of resolutions standing committee filled, and seven councils (88%) did not. Those councils without a Resolutions standing committee reported a lack of interest in members, little time or generally a lack of active members in the council.

With the phasing out of the resolutions standing committee to fully implement the strategic plan in 2023, three councils reported that they will try to commit to educating members of the resolutions taken and actions taken. Four councils reported that they do not know how the phasing out of the resolutions standing committee will affect their council. Once council did not give an answer as it had decided to disband.

Four councils (50%) described their level of knowledge and awareness of issues being discussed by government as "not aware", three councils (38%) as "some knowledge" and one (13%) as "very aware" for the Federal level. The same percentages of knowledge were reported for the Provincial level. Five councils (63%) described their level of knowledge and awareness of issues for the Local level as "some knowledge", two councils (25%) were "not aware" and one council (13%) was "very aware".



Councils reported as not having monitored or acted upon any other federal or provincial bills.

#### LEGISLATION

Eight of our parish councils contributed to the 2022 Parish Council Annual Report Survey. Of the eight that participated, one of them has just recently been disbanded. As this council was still considered a council during the time of the survey their answers were included in the total results.

With the phasing out of the legislation standing committee to fully implement the strategic plan in 2023, five councils indicated that they will still try to keep informed and three councils expressed doubt that legislation will be a priority in their council.

Four of the councils (50%) reported that they only have some knowledge on Bill C-230: Protection of Freedom of Conscience). Three councils (38%) are not aware of Bill C-230 and one council (13%) is very aware.



Five councils (63%) reported that they only have some knowledge on Bill C-7: Medical Assistance in Dying). Two councils (25%) are very aware of Bill C-7 and one council (13%) is not aware.




Just some added information from the Communique of National Chairperson of Legislation Glenda Carson, October 27, 2022 regarding Bill C-230: "On October 5<sup>th</sup>, this bill was defeated at its second reading. The bill aimed to make it a federal offence to intimidate or coerce a medical professional to participate in any action related to medical assistance in dying (MAiD). As a point of information, while this bill dealt specifically with euthanasia, the concern over protecting healthcare workers' conscience rights also

extends to abortion services."

Except for the effect on the financial statements of the matter described in the previous paragraph, the financial statements in my personal judgement present fairly, in all material respects the financial position of The St. Boniface Diocesan Council as at December 31, 2022, and the statements of operations for that year.



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# **St. Boniface Day of Reflection**

The St. Boniface Diocesan Council of The Catholic Women's League of Canada hosted its Day of Reflection, "Catholic and Living It!" on Saturday, October 22, 2022. The half-day presentation featured three different ways that people are or have been "Catholic and Living It!"



The first presentation featured Fr. John Sianchuk from St. Joseph's Ukrainian Church in Winnipeg, accompanied by Lesia Sianchuk. Shrine Administrator of the

*Bishop Velychkovsky National Martyr's Shrine,* who kept us enthralled with the life story of this future saint. On June 27, 2001, Pope St. John Paul II beatified a number of Ukrainian martyrs who

gave up their lives for Christ under the Soviet Union's atheistic regime during the 20<sup>th</sup> century rather than deny Jesus Christ and His Church. One of those priests was a Redemptorist Bishop, Vasyl Velychkovsky, who was exiled to Winnipeg. Bishop Velychkovsky died a martyr's death on



June 30, 1973 and was buried in All Saints Cemetery in Winnipeg. After being beatified, his body and holy relics were enshrined at St. Joseph's Ukrainian Catholic Church. Many pilgrims come and pray before Blessed Vasyl, seeking his powerful intercession. Fr. John completed his presentation by blessing us all with holy oil.



The second presentation came to us from Fr. Francois Paradis, a Catholic priest and member of the Missionary Oblate of Mary Immaculate since August 15, 1967. He was ordained in July 1972 and his entire priestly ministry has been with the Ojibwa First Nations communities of Southern Manitoba. In 2007, Returning to Spirit became his full-time ministry. Fr. Francois Spoke about his experiences while ministering to the indigenous people of Manitoba, as well as his work in promoting

reconciliation in Manitoba.

The morning was rounded off with beautiful music from the Youth Choir from the parish of Mary, Mother of the Church, headed by Jason Cegayle. The choir plans to travel to Portugal in August 2023 for World Youth Day and is currently raising funds for that pilgrimage.

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# STANDING RULES OF ANNUAL MEETING OF MEMBERS

Each Annual Meeting of Members (AMM) sets its own standing rules in accordance with *Robert's Rules of Order*. They are applicable only for the duration of the AMM in session only. Even though the standard rules may be the same from one year to the next, the rules must be adopted by each new AMM.

At the beginning of the business session of an AMM, a motion is proposed, debated and voted on to adopt the standing rules of the AMM. This motion requires a two-thirds vote. To rescind or amend the rules once they have been adopted requires a two-thirds vote. To suspend a rule requires a majority vote. *(National Manual of Policy & Procedure)* 

#### Standing Rules for the 74<sup>th</sup> Annual Meetings of Members of the St. Boniface Diocesan Council of The Catholic Women's League of Canada.

#### Registration

- 1. Each person attending the AMM shall register at the AMM registration desk and shall be required to wear the official AMM badge for admission to all meetings.
- 2. Registrants shall be classified as voting delegates (parish council presidents), or accredited delegates (diocesan accredited, parish accredited, honorary life members, life members).
- 4. The diocesan treasurer, at the beginning of the business session, shall provide a credentials report summarizing the number of voting members present at the AMM and shall submit a list of the names of voting members. When adopted, the credentials report shall be the official roll of voting members. If additional voting members are admitted after the report has been adopted, a supplementary report shall be given and adopted when no business is pending. Due notice having been given, ten percent (10%) of the voting members shall constitute a quorum.

#### **Seating Arrangements**

4. The business sessions of the AMM shall have a designated area in which all voting members will be seated. All members are requested to be in their seats at least five (5) minutes before the scheduled sessions open.

#### **Motions and Debate**

- 5. The chair shall: (a) state all questions and motions to the meeting before they are open to discussion; and (b) put all questions and motions to the meeting before the vote is taken thereon.
- 6. Every motion shall have a seconder. The mover of a motion shall have the privilege of speaking first to a motion (no longer than three (3) minutes).
- 7. The mover of a motion or her designate, may speak to open and close debate. No other member shall speak more than once on the same motion or longer than three (3) minutes without permission of the assembly granted by a two-thirds vote without debate.
- 8. Those wishing to speak shall use the microphones and upon being recognized by the chair, state name, status and council.
- 9. When time is of the essence, voting members shall be given priority to speak over non-voting members.

#### Voting

- 10. Voting members attending the AMM must have submitted a signed credential form and shall submit it to the AMM registration desk.
- 11. As voting delegates, parish council presidents shall have the power to vote on all questions.
- 12. Accredited delegates may vote on any question except the election of officers, amendments to the *Constitution & Bylaws* and increases in per capita fees.
- 13. Non-voting members and spiritual advisors may speak at business sessions when recognized by the chair; but shall not introduce motions or vote.
- 14. Voting cards shall be issued to the voting members and these cards shall be exhibited when a member votes.
- 15. The chair shall ask for affirmative and negative votes only and shall declare the outcome of the vote.

#### Financial

16. The auditor's/reviewer's report regarding the annual financial statement shall be adopted by the diocesan executive and presented to the assembly at the Annual Meeting of Members for information

#### Resolutions

17. Only resolutions submitted to the resolutions committee by parish councils or diocesan chairpersons by the deadline date set by the diocesan chairperson of social justice shall be considered for presentation to this AMM.


- 18. The procedure for presenting resolutions to the business session shall be:
  - (a) the chairperson of social justice shall read the resolutions after the appropriate chairperson's report
  - (b) the president of the parish/diocesan council submitting the resolution shall move its adoption
  - (c) the president of the parish/diocesan council submitting the resolution, or her designate, shall speak first to the resolution.
- 19. Final wording of titles, briefs and action plans shall be the responsibility of the resolutions committee.

#### Miscellaneous

- 20. No materials shall be distributed, displayed or sold at this AMM without the prior approval of the diocesan executive.
- 21. No appeals for support or collections of any kind or circulation of petitions shall be made unless a written request is presented in advance to the diocesan president and approved by the diocesan executive.
- 22. Any motion adopted at this Annual Meeting of Members shall become effective at the adjournment of the Annual Meeting of Members unless an alternate time for the action to become effective has been stipulated in the motion.

#### 23. Minutes

- (a) The diocesan president shall appoint a Minutes Review Committee to verify the minutes of all meetings of the AMM (includes minutes of elections).
- (b) The diocesan executive shall approve the minutes of this AMM at its post-AMM meeting.
- (c) The approved minutes of AMM shall be circulated to all voting members of that AMM. If corrections are necessary after approval, they may be made by motion at the next AMM.
