CANADIAN CONFERENCE OF CATHOLIC BISHOPS

• **“Gender Identity- Gender Expression”, Bill C-16**

When you access the CCCB site, click on “Media” and then click on “Statements and Letters”. You will then be able to read the complete article as to where our Catholic Bishops stand on the issue of Gender Identity-Gender Expression. Discuss this issue within your Council and decide how your council will support our Canadian Bishops. The article states “Questions about freedom of speech, freedom of association and freedom of religion are also likely to arise in connection with this legislation. We urge those of Catholic faith, and all people of good will, to be diligent in defending these freedoms and the vision of human dignity on which they are based”.

• **Mining Industry in Latin America (CCCB)**

CWL members are encouraged to write letters to their members of Parliament and to the Prime Minister – to raise their voices in support of injustices that the Canadian Bishops have raised to government. We are to express our concerns over environmental degradation and human rights violations caused by “Canadian” “PM. Trudeau to respect his electoral promise to create an ombudsperson. The **ombudsperson to monitor and investigate complaints of abuses of companies abroad. (Take 15 min. at your council meeting to all hand write a letter to your MP and another to the Prime Minister. Please check with “Government Mail Free of Postage” and check out the new regulations as of Feb.13, 2017. If possible put all of your letters in separate envelopes and then put in one envelope and mail per directions given for such mailings).**

Child Pornography

The definition of “Child Pornography” can be found at “justice.gc.ca. child pornography” with the latest update August 24-2017. In a statement of August 11, 2017 the police state that “the sexual violence against children continue to increase”.

In the case of Refugee claimants from the U.S.A. charged with importing pornography, they are not necessarily returned to the U.S. – their case is reviewed and they may be allowed to be let into Canada.

Dear MLA:

I am writing to ask you to support Bill 34- the Medical Assistance in Dying (Protection for Health Professionals & Others) Act., which is currently being considered by the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba. If passed, this legislation will protect Manitoba health care professionals from having to act against their conscience.

The Bill would make participation in assisted suicide voluntary and would overrule the policies of regulatory bodies should they require doctors, nurses and other health professionals to participate, in Medical Assistance in Dying. I agree that no one should be forced to participate, either directly or indirectly, in ending a patient's life. No one should be discriminated against because of their stand. Please take whatever legislative steps are required to ensure that no one is forced to participate in assisted suicide

Canada Summer Jobs Program- Conflict of Religious Freedom

Attached are letters that President Margaret Ann has sent: one to the P.M. Trudeau, and a letter to Rev. Lionel Gendron (President, Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops)

The letter to the CCCB is in regards to **Development and Peace** which has been reported to advocate to reproductive rights for women that would include abortion and sterilization. We are for the time being withholding contributions to the CCODP until the CWL receives direction from the CCCB.

Female Genital Mutilation

Is a human rights violation, but P.M. Trudeau has decided to remove listing it as an intolerable practice from Canada's Citizenship Guide. There is an online petition that you can sign

200 million women alive today have undergone Female Genital Mutilation. The P.M. has called it "barbaric" but is still removing it from the citizenship guide. The citizenship guide informs newcomers that FGM is a crime in Canada, HOWEVER, Canada's Prime Minister has decided to delete this information.

Grateful that despite hail, lots of rain to no rain that the yields were not all that bad. Grateful for the abundance in our lives given to us by our loving God.

Catholic Conference of Catholic Bishops

A new document unanimously adopted by the Bishops of Canada (Sept. 27) called for the "Protecting of Minors from sexual abuse: A call to the Catholic Faithful in Canada for Healing, Reconciliation and Transformation" to inform and educate clergy, members of religious communities and personnel. This book "put forward 69 recommendations inspired by 9 lessons which Bishops have learned through their collective experiences in the past 25 years. It strongly stresses that "Victims must come first". (more info can be found under the Arch Diocese of St. Boniface, and Winnipeg Diocese newsletters)

Sexual Abuse in the Catholic Church

Bishop Albert LeGatt speaks on the recent Sexual Abuse scandal in the church and of the legal process taken in the diocese after a priest is taken from active ministry when allegations are launched. (Archdiocese of St. Boniface newsletter.)

Also found under that same newsletter: Fr. Robert Barron, speaks on the recent scandals of sexual abuse in the States. He speaks on why people are wondering "should they remain catholic" and responds as to why they should not abandon the church at such a crucial time.

JOY SMITH FOUNDATION

The most recent article of Oct. 25th states that Human Trafficking is "not just a big city problem" "Ontario is very busy with human trafficking compared to other provinces. Two thirds of human trafficking cases in Canada are in Ontario". (S. S. Yateman OPP. Anti human trafficking Investigations Co-ordinating Team).

Canadian T.V. **MarketPlace** this past week had a program on the Dominican Republic and how the people and police turn a blind eye to the prostituting of very young and underaged girls in their country. They are being bought by vacationers who make the holiday trip purposely for that, many of which are Canadians.

IMMIGRATION & REFUGEES

We had two “legal” immigrants speak to us in Neepawa at the Winnipeg CWL workshop about the paper work, the years waiting and the cost of coming to Canada.

If you are an “illegal” immigrant it now takes 20 months to process that person. Toronto’s cost for temporary housing has cost 64 million dollars with Ottawa pledging only 11 million dollars towards that cost. Immigrants arrived so far in 2018---10,744, in 2017---20,593 illegal border crossers. It is **against the law** to cross irregularly into Canada. New arrivals can’t be prosecuted for illegally entering Canada once they apply for refugee status. Legitimate refugee claimants aren’t treated as law breakers.

HUMAN RIGHTS

December the 10th is Human Rights Day. In 1948 the United Nations General Assembly adopted the Declaration of Human Rights. These Human Rights are:

1. Right to Equality
2. Freedom from Discrimination
3. Right to Life, Liberty, & Personal Security
4. Freedom from Slavery
5. Freedom from Torture & Degrading Treatment

These rights may vary in different countries. There are 30 basic Human Rights.

On October 24th we practiced one of our rights which was “Freedom to Vote”. This right is recognized as the most important right in 5 of 8 countries.
